INTRODUCTION


Welcome to the *Harvesting the Fruit of Vatican II Faith Formation Series!* I'm delighted that you've decided to invite your parishioners to explore the documents of the Second Vatican Council directly, and I'm confident that you will find this series to be a useful tool for providing a spiritually enriching experience for all concerned.

The *Harvesting the Fruit of Vatican II Faith Formation Series*, which will ultimately address each of the sixteen Council documents, currently consists of the following:

- PART ONE -The Opening Address of Pope John XXIII The Dogmatic Constitution on Divine Revelation - *Dei Verbum*

The ideal introduction to the Second Vatican Council, PART ONE begins with an exploration of the Opening Address that Blessed Pope John XXIII delivered at the Council's inaugural session. This remarkable address provides indispensible insight into the Council's mission and mandate, answering such critically important questions as: *Why was the Council called and what did it hope to accomplish? What is the Council's relationship with the sacred deposit of faith? Why do we call Vatican II "a pastoral council?"*

From there we will move on to The Dogmatic Constitution on Divine Revelation - *Dei Verbum*. This rich and beautiful document addresses such basic yet crucial questions as: *How does man come to know God and His will? What is Divine Revelation? From where does the Bible come and how is it related to sacred Tradition?*"



- PART TWO – The Decree on the Apostolate of the Laity - *Apostolicam Actuositatem* The Decree on the Mission Activity of the Church - *Ad Gentes*

PART TWO of the *Harvesting the Fruit of Vatican II Faith Formation Series* takes participants on a timely journey into The Decree on the Apostolate of the Laity (*Apostolicam Actuositatem*) and The Decree on the Mission Activity of the Church (*Ad Gentes*) – documents that serve as a "wake-up call" for those Catholics who misunderstand the role of the layperson as one of silent spectator.

In the Decree on the Apostolate of the Laity, the Council Fathers offer important direction for authentic lay participation in the mission of the Church, giving us great insight into how it is most fruitfully expressed in our parishes, in our families and in our communities. The insights gained here find particular relevance given the shortage of priests in so many places.

From there we will move on to the Decree on the Mission Activity of the Church; a document aimed at reinvigorating the missionary zeal of the Church. Similar to the message of

Apostolicam Actuositatem, participants will discover that the layperson is called to active service, and the work of the missionary has a uniquely *Catholic* component that cannot be overlooked.

The unifying foundation for *Apostolicam Actuositatem* and *Ad Gentes* lies in the Lord's Great Commission as recorded in Matthew 28:19-20 – a commission that is proper to each and every Christian. You will emerge from our exploration of these rich and beautiful documents reenergized to answer your own Baptismal call.



Pope John Paul II said that one of the primary questions faced by Council Fathers like himself at Vatican II was *"Church, what do you say of yourself?"*

In PART THREE of the *Harvesting the Fruit of Vatican II Faith Formation Series* we will examine the Council's answer as found in the Dogmatic Constitution on the Church - *Lumen Gentium*. While any part of the *Harvesting the Fruit of Vatican II* series may be approached at any time, *Part I* (and *Volume I*) is indeed the most logical place to begin since it starts, well... at the very beginning; with the Opening Address that Pope John XXIII delivered at the Council's inaugural session. The insights gained here will serve as a firm foundation for launching into the actual documents of the Council in the lessons to follow.

The *Harvesting the Fruit of Vatican II* guides approach the Council documents incrementally and systematically using a series of "lessons" that make it easy for participants to arrive at an authentic interpretation of the Council's teachings in the *only* way possible - by the light of sacred Tradition. The user-friendly format of *Harvesting the Fruit of Vatican II* makes for an approachable yet thought provoking resource that one can use as either "reading material" or as a "study tool" for those participants who are seeking a greater challenge. (See "Reading vs. Studying" section of the Introduction on page *vi* for more details.)

With ample opportunity provided for both "readers" and "studiers" to record personal insights and to reflect upon the conciliar text for spiritual application, *Harvesting the Fruit of Vatican II* is a unique faith formation tool that offers the best of both worlds no matter how it is used. Your particular approach to *Harvesting the Fruit of Vatican II* is entirely up to you and your group.

The following overview of the format used in *Harvesting the Fruit of Vatican II* is provided in the Prologue to each study guide. It's a good idea to review this information with group study participants during an orientation meeting.

The lessons in *Harvesting the Fruit of Vatican II* are arranged as follows:

Introduction

• Each lesson begins with a brief overview of key points concerning the Council in general, and/or the document we are exploring in particular. Most of the lessons have study questions relating to information given in this section; so in addition to reading the Council document (included in this booklet) be sure to read this commentary section before proceeding to the questions.

The Council Documents

• The Council documents that we will be exploring are reproduced in this guide. They are broken down into segments according to the content of each lesson and the End Notes are assembled after the final lesson for each document. (See Table of Contents.) References appear as follows: AG 6§3 - denotes *Ad Gentes* - article 6 - section (or paragraph) 3.

Study Questions

• Each lesson has a set of ten study questions that are designed to call your attention to some of the key teachings contained in the Council documents. Oftentimes, you will be asked to read from Sacred Scripture and the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* in order to answer the questions. This helps us to interpret the authentic meaning of the Council's teaching by the light of sacred Tradition. Taking the time to read these references is equally as important for those who choose to use the *Harvesting the Fruit of Vatican II* guide as reading material since context within sacred Tradition is absolutely crucial for an authentic understanding the Council's teaching and intent.

Reflections

• Some of the most important aspects of the Council's teaching involves the clarion calls to holiness; for participation in the New Evangelization, and for engagement in acts of social justice. Following each set of ten study questions you will find reflection questions that are designed to assist you in discovering opportunities put the Council's wisdom to work in your daily life. Study groups may include this section in the group discussion, or it can be treated as a private journal as would naturally be the case with those who are using the *Harvesting the Fruit of Vatican II* guide as reading material. Either way, as in all of our efforts in *Harvesting the Fruit of Vatican II*, you will find that prayer is an integral part of this exercise.

Action Plan

• After prayerfully contemplating the reflection questions, you will have an opportunity to consider a concrete plan that will help you turn your reflections into actions. Those who are participating in a study group may decide to collectively commit to certain activities, the progress of which can become a point of discussion in the weeks to follow. Study groups might also choose to use the Reflection and Action Plan portions of *Harvesting*

the Fruit of Vatican II as the focal point for a retreat. In any event, group study participants may chose to share their individual ideas for future actions and can offer encouragement and support to one another in carrying out their respective plans.

Mass Intention

• You will be asked to consider a Mass intention based upon your Reflections, so that you may prayerfully place it upon the altar at Mass in the week ahead. This will help you to move from Reflection to Action by drawing upon the strength of Christ in the Sacred Liturgy, the "font from which all power flows" (cf SC 10).

Suggested Responses

• Following the Reflection portion of the lesson you will find suggested responses to each of the study questions. (There are no suggested responses for the reflection questions, however, as each one of us possess gifts that render us uniquely prepared to serve the Church and one another in different ways.) The responses to the study questions are not intended to be exhaustive; but rather to serve as guidance in helping you to gain insights that are in keeping with what Pope Benedict XVI calls an "interpretation of continuity and authentic reform." If you are treating *Harvesting the Fruit* as a study guide, refrain from reading the suggested responses until after you've answered each question to the best of your ability or reviewed the lesson in your study group. In all cases, be sure to review the suggested responses before moving on to the next lesson as they may contain some important insights that deserve deeper consideration.

Summary

• At the conclusion of each lesson you will find a brief bullet-point summary listing some of the key themes that were uncovered in our exploration. You will occasionally find blank space for "NOTES" throughout the guide. Make use of this space by jotting down ideas, questions or simply to note those parts of each lesson that stand out to you most.



Reading vs. Studying

As previously mentioned, some individuals may not have the time or necessarily not feel up to the challenge of embarking upon a "study" of the Council documents in the manner just described, and would prefer instead to treat *Harvesting the Fruit of Vatican II* more like reading material.

For Pastors, Directors of Religious Education, and other parish leaders, this can be a very useful "ice breaker" for parishioners who are truly interested in learning more about Vatican II, but are somewhat intimidated by the idea of "studying" the Council documents. Let them know - *If this describes you; no problem!*

Invite "readers" to simply read through each lesson beginning with the Introduction after which they may then move on to the applicable portion of the Council document that is being treated within. When they get to the Study Questions, they may simply read them, one at a time – Bible and Catechism references included – and then go directly to the related Suggested Response for each one.

As the saying goes, the only way to eat an elephant is one bite at a time. The deliberate, systematic approach taken in *Harvesting the Fruit of Vatican II* makes digesting the Council documents much easier and far less intimidating than many individuals expect. In no time at all they will find themselves moving easily through the material. In fact, they may be surprised at how often they feel compelled to add some insights of their own along the way. If so, be sure to instruct them to use the space provided after each question to jot down your thoughts. In short order, even your most timid parishioners will be sharing personal insights within the group. In any event, encourage all "readers" to make good use of the Reflection portion of the material treating it as their own personal journal. After all, the Catholic faith is not just something to be known; it's meant to be lived!

Additional Materials Needed

In addition to this *Harvesting the Fruit of Vatican II* booklet participants will need a Catholic Bible. As the Dogmatic Constitution on Divine Revelation, *Dei Verbum*, tells us, it is very important that they work with a "suitable and correct" translation (DV 22). This will ensure doctrinal reliability as well as a complete presentation of the canon as the deuterocanonical books will not be found in most Protestant Bibles. Some suggestions include: The Revised Standard Version - Catholic Edition, the Douay Rheims Bible, and the Jerusalem Bible.

Participants will also need a copy of the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* as they will be asked to read from the Catechism in order to answer some of the study questions. The Catechism will be referenced in the following format: "CCC 967." This refers to "*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, article 967."

As mentioned, the documents of the Council that we are exploring are reproduced in this booklet by permission of the Vatican Library. They represent the documents' official English translation (with the occasional typo and all!) as provided by the Holy See.

To eliminate the necessity of flipping back and forth between the individual lessons and the document, we've divided each one into sections corresponding to the content of the various lessons. This will allow participants to read seamlessly through each lesson with a limited amount of flipping pages between the commentary, the questions, and the document itself.

As they read the Council documents in preparation for each of the lessons, participants may find it helpful to have a highlighter handy in order to mark the parts that strike you as particularly noteworthy.

Remember - this is a workbook – participants should be encouraged to make notes in it and highlight it wherever they see fit. As they refer to this book in years to come the notes that they made will serve to refresh their memory and reinforce what they discovered.

Needless to say, responses to the study questions should be written directly in the booklet. It may be a good idea for participants to use pencil, especially if participating in a study group. As possible responses are discussed within the group, some individuals may feel compelled to make additions or changes to their responses.

A Word of Thanks to the USCCB

The approach offered in *Harvesting the Fruit of Vatican II* reflects the encouragement to embrace the missionary spirit of the Church and to answer the call to participate in the New Evangelization issued by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops in a document entitled *Our Hearts Were Burning Within Us.* Some of the bishops' key points that inspired our approach in *Harvesting the Fruit of Vatican II* are as follow:

Pope John Paul II's encyclical *Redemptoris Missio* and our own national plan for evangelization, *Go and Make Disciples*, call for such efforts, and their success will require adult believers who are eager and articulate in sharing a faith they *understand, embrace, and live*. (28)

Many Catholics seem "lukewarm" in faith (cf. Rev 3:14ff.) or have a limited understanding of what the Church believes, teaches, and lives. (35)

Use of Scripture and the Catechism—including the sources from which it draws, those to which it refers, and other catechetical resources based on and consonant with it—will help adults grasp the content of the faith and its practical application in Christian living. (88)

The Catholic faith is like a symphony in which the unity of faith finds expression in richly diverse formulations and manifestations. As the *General Directory for Catechesis* states: "The maturation of the Christian life requires that it be cultivated in all its dimensions: knowledge of the faith, liturgical life, moral formation, prayer, belonging to community, missionary spirit. When catechesis omits one of these elements, the Christian faith does not attain full development." (89)

It is with gratitude for the guidance offered by the USCCB that the approach taken in *Harvesting the Fruit of Vatican II* deliberately addresses each one of the dimensions suggested by the bishops as necessary for fully cultivating a mature Christian life.



In the words of Blessed Pope John XXIII, the Second Vatican Council like all Church councils is a "solemn celebration of the union of Christ and His Church;" a celebration through which the Bride of Christ appropriates more deeply the gift of Divine Revelation.


Perhaps the most valuable instruction we can offer to our participants, therefore, is this: always prepare to explore the Council and thus *to meet the Lord* through prayer. Encourage them to implore the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary that the Spirit of truth will help us to grow in both knowledge and in love for her Son through our efforts in this study.

From here, the members of your parish should be well prepared to begin *Harvesting the Fruit of Vatican II*.

Yes, it will take time, and it most certainly will take effort, but as Jesus once told His disciples, "Indeed the harvest is great!"
